After sustaining a spinal cord injury and learning to walk again, Tyler saw the need to make sport more accessible for people of all ages and abilities. From 2004 to 2014, he helped build adaptive snowboarding internationally through Snowboard Canada, culminating in his competition at the Sochi Paralympics. Pickleball holds similar appeal for Tyler as a sport builder. As the sport continues to grow, with potential pathways to future Olympic and Paralympic programs, he wants to help advance pickleball from recreational participation to high-performance competition. He is also an investor in a pickleball company, www.ramsports.com, which is helping grow the sport in Southeast Asia through facilities, coaching, clinics, professional leagues, and equipment manufacturing.

Few sports are both social and competitive while also welcoming players of all ages and abilities. Pickleball is one of them. As the sport continues to grow in Canada, its NSO needs experienced leadership in governance and in building a pathway from grassroots participation to the podium. Tyler brings valuable experience as both an athlete and a sport builder.
